Skywarn

It's that time of year again, where hopefully we can shed off this cold snowy weather we have been cloaked in since January and think about spring activities and warmer weather. Along with the warmer weather, comes the chance for severe weather. Our severe weather season typically runs June, July, and August; but we have had severe weather and tornadoes in every season with the only month without a confirmed tornado is February. As an amateur radio operator, we play a large role in the severe weather notification process by providing the ground truth reports the NWS needs to assist them and emergency management with determining the severity of the weather and based partially on our reports, warning the public.

As a amateur radio operator, our part relates to the storm reports. We have the potential to provide real-time reports to the NWS, who also has amateur radio stations at the local NWS offices. During the more widespread severe weather events that impacts out repeater coverage area, the Milwaukee Area Skywarn Association (MASA) may activate a severe weather net on our repeater. The two amateur radio operators you will hear on the repeater from MASA are Skip Voros, WD9HAS; and Gregg Schulz, W9AWX.

During the nets, you will hear what to report and the reporting process, but there is not time to explain all the nuances of a severe weather event and how to prepare for them. This is where attending a severe weather spotter training class is essential. Not only do the classes presented by the NWS and MASA provide the items that the NWS wish reported, they discuss what shouldn't be reported and how to report them. Attending a class also can help to keep you safe from the severe weather you are observing by giving you clues as to what you are looking at around a storm's environment.

You can find a list of local spotter classes given by the Milwaukee NWS at <https://www.weather.gov/mkx/spotter-schedule>. There are several amateur radio classes, given by MASA amateur radio operators. They are for hams by hams, in the Milwaukee area. The Milwaukee Repeater Club is one of them, scheduled for the evening of March 23rd at the Oak Creek Police Department at 6pm. There is another class as part of the Milwaukee/ Waukesha ARES group meeting on April 2nd at 6:30pm. Finally, there is the class at Ham Radio Outlet on May 11th at 1pm. There is also a basic class given in the City of New Berlin on April 6th at 1pm and an advanced spotter class on April 13th. The MASA statewide class listing can be found at

<http://www.mke-skywarn.org/schedule.htm>. We encourage all amateur radio operators, trained and untrained, to attend a weather spotter safety training class this Spring.

CONTROL OPERATORS GUIDLINE

“Serving/Volunteering as a control operator is a privilege, and is taken seriously by the Board and Members of the MRC91. This selected group has agreed to abide by the guidelines set forth in the following document.”

Control Operators are given access to a code system, which enables them to remotely manipulate the main and remote sites, as needed. The codes they are given are private and are for their use exclusively, and are never to be shared outside of this group. This group will work in conjunction with the Trustee and The Board, in order to comply with the Rules and Regulations set forth under Part 97 by the FCC. It will be required that a written log be kept of all actions taken by control operators and emailed to the Trustee. This group is expected to work in conjunction with one another, and not to work independently without the knowledge of at least one other member. This ensures a level of transparency. Licensees are responsible to make sure “their own” communications follow the FCC Part 97 Regulations. The Control Operators are not the “repeater police” and we do not want anyone to “correct or reprimand” any users of the repeater, on the air. However, the Control Operators do have the authority to shut down the system, when and if the conversation or malicious interference, violates FCC Part 97.

Although the Control Operators are a committee, they will remain in this position, regardless of change of Board of Directors, but may be removed under the following circumstances.

*Resignation

*Not current with membership

*Non Compliance With Expectations and Duties/Requirements set forth in this guideline.

*Becomes a Silent Key

Removal of any or all Control Operators will be done in a 2 step process.

1. Complaint, problem or request for removal will be addressed at a regular membership meeting. After discussion, the Control Op or Ops will be given the ability to defend themselves. A vote will be set for the following regular meeting. The process will be posted in the minutes on the web site prior to the Vote at the subsequent meeting.
2. Vote of the membership attending the following meeting will determine the outcome.

When necessary:

To add a person to the control op’s group, a name is to be put forward at a membership meeting, along with what makes them a good candidate, after discussion, the proposed

person could be added by vote of the attending membership or tabled for the subsequent meeting.

Duties and Requirements

First and foremost, we are known as “The Friendly One”. Be an example of “Good Amateur Practice”. Be able to work well with others and be a productive part this team. Attend meetings and activities whenever possible. Listen to the repeater often so you will have you finger on the pulse of what is going on, Be flexible and willing to give and accept direction. Communicate any problems or ideas amongst your group and/or to the Trustee or Board. Use of good judgement in communicating with others. Must be able and willing to monitor the repeater frequently and inform the team of your inability to monitor for extended periods of time due to ie: vacation, illness, or other conflicts. Take this position seriously, and understand the Membership and the License of this Club, largely depends on your actions. All Control Operators will be required to attend a short training to ensure they are all able to perform tasks required for this position. We want to ensure that all involved parties have a complete understanding of what “qualifies” shutting down the system, and for how long. This will also give the Control Ops a chance to ask questions and get further clarification, and to make certain, they are all on the same page.

END OF CONTROL OPERATORS GUIDELINE

The Control Operators are a Committee, working within this guideline, and under direction of the Trustee, Board of Directors and the Membership. Recommended changes to this guideline document, can be made by a quorum at a regular Membership meeting.

CONTROL OPERATORS CHARTER

Control Operators Charter

This Control Operators Charter outlines what is expected of the Trustee and Control Operators, and it documents the structure, guidelines, and procedures of the Control Operators team. Changes to this document must follow this process:

- Changes to the document can be recommended to the Board of Directors at any time without advance notice by any member in good standing
- Board of Directors must approve, by majority vote, to bring proposed changes to the membership
- Requested changes and advanced notice of a vote must be described in the newsletter and detailed changes described on the front page of the website
- At the following month's membership meeting, detailed changes will be distributed to members present, and can be ratified by a two-thirds vote of the present Membership

If at any time the MRC bylaws (a.k.a. "Constitution") are changed in a way that affects designation of the Trustee or Control Operators, or in a way that affects the Membership's ability to remove members of the Board of Directors, this document must be newly reviewed and ratified as described above.

Rights for Action by the Milwaukee Repeater Club, Inc. ("MRC" or "the club"):

The Milwaukee Repeater Club owns and operates the equipment that comprises the club's amateur radio repeater system. The club, through its station licensee, "is responsible for the proper operation of the station in accordance with the FCC Rules" (§97.103), and therefore has the right to control and limit use of the repeater.

The Milwaukee Repeater Club assigns individuals as MRC Control Operators, charged with the responsibility and authority described in FCC Rules Part 97, to control the Club's repeater to ensure that the operation of the repeater complies with Part 97 and club policy. The responsibilities of the MRC Control Operators are based on the following sections of Part 97:

- §97.205 (e): "... Limiting the use of a repeater to only certain user stations is permissible."
 - MRC holds the right, granted by Part 97, to create and apply additional rules for users operating through a repeater system beyond the Part 97 Rules, and may restrict its use to any user for any reason.
- §97.105: "the control operator must ensure the immediate proper operation of the station..."
 - As the proper operation must be "immediate," a Control Operator may exercise their discretion to provide guidance or perform corrective action at any time.

Team Structure

By FCC Rules Part 97, the structure and designation of the team is as follows:

Trustee (a.k.a. “Club Licensee”) is primarily responsible for the proper operation of the station (in this case the repeater system), must hold an FCC operator license, and is designated by an officer of the club. Note that by the FCC Rules, this person is neither designated by club Membership vote nor chosen by other members of the Control Operators team. This is defined by:

- §97.5 (2): *A club station license grant.* A club station license grant may be held only by the person who is the license trustee **designated by an officer of the club**. The trustee must be a person who holds an operator/primary station license grant. ...
- §97.103 Station licensee responsibilities
 - (a) The station licensee is responsible for the proper operation of the station in accordance with the FCC Rules. When the control operator is a different amateur operator than the station licensee, both persons are equally responsible for proper operation of the station.
 - (b) **The station licensee must designate the station control operator.** The FCC will presume that the station licensee is also the control operator, unless documentation to the contrary is in the station records.

Control Operators are then designated by the Trustee and tasked with ensuring proper adherence to FCC Rules. Note that by the FCC Rules, Control Operators are neither designated by club Membership vote nor by the Board of Directors. This is defined by:

- §97.3 (13): *Control operator.* An amateur operator **designated by the licensee of a station** to be responsible for the transmissions from that station to assure compliance with the FCC Rules.
- §97.7 Control operator required.
 - When transmitting, each amateur station must have a control operator. The control operator must be a person:
 - (a) For whom an amateur operator/primary station license grant appears on the ULS consolidated licensee database ...

Trustee:

By MRC policy, the Trustee will be considered the head Control Operator, and is expected to lead the Control Operator team.

The Trustee should be a current member in good standing, and ideally should have worked with on the Control Operator team for at least two years. The Trustee should have strong leadership qualities, good judgement, be fair and kind to others, and demonstrate a commitment to the club. This person is responsible both to the club Membership, and to the Board of Directors as the elected representation of the Membership.

The Trustee may be removed by the Board of Directors at any time for any reason, but only if a new Trustee has been designated by the Board of Directors by two-thirds vote.

The Trustee is selected by the following process:

- Board Member nominates a new Trustee to the Board of Directors
- Board of Directors must approve, by two-thirds vote, elect the new Trustee
- Notice of the change in Trustee must be described in the newsletter and on the front page of the website, including a brief biography and their qualifications

Trustee Duties:

The Trustee is responsible for the proper operation of the Repeater system, as well as its adherence to FCC Rules. The Trustee is also responsible for selecting a Control Operator team in a timely fashion and leading that team in being effective in helping the Trustee carry out his or her duties.

The Trustee is foremost responsible to the Board of Directors, as the elected delegates of the Membership, and is thus expected to promptly respond to any requests from the Board of Directors.

Periodic reports are to be provide by the Trustee as described below, and can also be requested by the Board of Directors at any time:

- Annual report, in person or by a Control Operator designee, at the first meeting holding a quorum after January 1st:
 - Current status of all equipment that comprise the repeater system
 - History of any significant actions as Control Operator during the prior year, including but not limited to:
 - Formal warnings to repeater users
 - Repeater shutdowns or other actions that were necessary to enforce adherence to FCC Rules
 - List of the current Control Operator team, and any changes to the team over the prior year
- Monthly report by email, or other written notice, to the Board of Directors:
 - Changes to status of repeater system equipment
 - Plans for any upcoming changes to the repeater system
 - Formal warnings to repeater users
 - Repeater shutdowns or other actions that were necessary to enforce adherence to FCC Rules
 - Any past or planned changes to the Control Operator team

Control Operators:

As defined in FCC Rules, the Trustee selects the Control Operators as his or her delegates. The Trustee may select or remove Control Operators and his or her sole discretion, and is not required to receive any votes or approvals in doing so.

The Trustee must, however, provide notice of any changes to the Control Operator team, as well as a brief biography and qualifications of any new members. The Trustee must also provide reasons for the removal of any Control Operator to the Board of Directors. As the delegates of the Membership, the Board of Directors may choose, at its discretion, to inform the Membership of any changes to the team.

Control Operators must be club members in good standing, and should show good judgement, be fair and kind to others, and demonstrate a commitment to the club.

Control Operator Duties:

First and foremost, a Control Operators duty is to:

1. Maintain proper functioning of the repeater system
2. Adherence to FCC Rules

Furthermore, MRC intends to keep the attitude of “The Friendly One,” and as such, Control Operators are expected to act in accordance with The Radio Amateur’s Code:

- **CONSIDERATE**
 - Never knowingly operates in such a way as to lessen the pleasure of others.
- **LOYAL**
 - Offers loyalty, encouragement, and support to other amateurs, local clubs, the IARU Radio Society in his/her country, through which Amateur Radio in his/her country is represented nationally and internationally.
- **PROGRESSIVE**
 - Keeps the station up-to-date. It is well-built and efficient. Operating practice is above reproach.
- **FRIENDLY**
 - Operates slowly and patiently when requested; offers friendly advice and counsel to the beginner; kind assistance, cooperation, and consideration for the interests of others. These are the marks of the amateur spirit.
- **BALANCED**
 - Radio is a hobby, never interfering with duties owed to family, job, school, or community.
- **PATRIOTIC**
 - Station and skills are always ready for service to country and community.

Even in control or enforcement actions, the Control Operators must keep the attitude these attitudes first and foremost. All actions taken must be as discrete as possible, and privacy of repeater users will be protected and not exposed outside of Control Operators and the Board of Directors unless absolutely necessary.

The Control Operators are required to keep a written log (including no less than names, times, and actions taken) of all control functions made, and all formal warnings or actions taken with repeater users. The logs must be promptly submitted to the Trustee, no less than weekly.

For repeater system hardware control, Control Operators must operate with confidentiality. The control frequencies and controller macro numbers must be guarded. In the event of a Trustee and complete Control Operator changeover, this information must be provided to the incoming Trustee, or in the event of no Trustee or Control Operator team, to the Board of Directors.

Regarding Obscene Language (including both voice and code):

The FCC rules prohibit Amateur stations from transmitting obscene or indecent words or language. Utterances of "any obscene, indecent or profane language by means of radio communications" are prohibited by Title 18, U.S.C. Section 1464. Under the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, the Commission may revoke any station license for violation of Section 1464 of Title 18. See 47 U.S.C. Section 312(a)(6).

Obscene speech is not protected by the First Amendment and cannot be broadcast at any time. To be obscene, material must meet a three point test: (1) an average person, applying contemporary community standards, must find that the material, as a whole, appeals to the prurient interest; (2) the material must depict or describe, in a patently offensive way, sexual conduct specifically defined by applicable law; and (3) the material, taken as a whole, must lack serious literary, artistic, political or scientific value. See *Miller v. California*, 413 U.S. 15 (1973).

The Commission defines indecency as language or material that, in context, depicts or describes, in terms patently offensive as measured by contemporary community standards, sexual or excretory activities or organs.
